Our Reading Curriculum Overview

Reception and Year I

In Reception and Year I, children take part in three reading practice sessions per week. They read a phonetically decodable book that is matched to their reading ability and allow the children to practice sessions the sounds and skills learnt during phonics lessons. Over the course of a week, in a small group they read the text first for fluency then prosody and finally to develop their comprehension skills. Reading practice sessions take part in a small group.

Year 2

In Year 2, our children take part in a reading practice carousel. The books chosen reflect the children's reading ability and, if appropriate, phonics stage. Sometimes, staff will use picture books with the children to further develop their inference and deduction skills.

Key Stage 2

Below are the texts that we use in our whole class reading sessions. Each text has been carefully chosen by our Key Stage 2 team to reflect a range of genre as well as ensuring the texts chosen will interest the children. We have also looked at the lexiles for each fiction text to ensure that children are reading texts which will allow them to extend their vocabulary. However, we have also thought about the content and context of each text as some although some texts have a lower lexile than others, the theme or a context of the text may be more challenging. We have chosen a diverse range of both male and female authors as well as stories written about other cultures. Alongside these texts, each Friday children will look at extracts from various genres and complete a range of comprehension questions linked to the texts to ensure that children have access texts from a range of genre each half term. We have carefully chosen these extracts to support the children's learning in other curriculum areas or further enrich their knowledge of the text or author that they are studying.

Year 3
In Year 3, children will begin whole class reading when ready. We base this decision on the needs of each class.
